Learning & Action (CCBLA) at Evergreen. Her 4r year tenure at the CCBLA enabled her to navigate community resources and helped build a network at her college where students could provide service to vulnerable populations such as formerly incarcerated youth, women & children, immigrants, refugees and the homeless. She is a proponent of putting education into practice as an advocate of non-traditional learning methodologies & decolonizing spaces. In 2018, Erika became a founding member of the Vomito Local art collective, in Lennox, CA where she grew up. Alongside other artists and lifelong residents of Lennox, they proudly organized the 1st "Noche de Rasquaches" in which intergenerational community members could participate in an official artist showcase for the first time in their lives. During her leadership in Vomito Local she gained valuable experience in grassroots organizing focused on creating access to art where barriers may exist, and in taking a lead in officiating & showcasing the voices that need to be heard, and/or often misrepresented. Erika currently lives in Eagle, Idaho with her loving husband, 2 cats and a dog named Worf. She serves delicious espresso by day and dances ballet folklorico by night!

Gennean Scott is currently serving as the Vice President of Human Capital and Inclusion for the Omaha Performing Arts. Where she assisted, in partnership with local colleges and universities, the development of Latinx youth conferences with over 100's of students attending annually. From there she continued after college by teaching and becoming an administrator in Title I schools promoting equity and inclusion in the Omaha school system.

In 2013, Gennean founded and directed a non-profit dance school, to promote equity in the arts to Omaha youth. Gennean is a co-founder of the Black Arts Leadership Alliance (BALA) a network of black professionals in the Midwest dedicated to empowering, training, recruiting, and retaining African Americans/Blacks in arts administration. She

also serves as a co-founder of the Nebraska Association of African American Human Resources Professionals, an organization designed to center Black voices in human resources and Blacks in the workplace. Ms. Scott is active in Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Inc and The Links, Inc where she serves as the local Chair of The Arts.
